A request from the John Fitzgerald Kennedy Library for participation in the fund-raising for the facility through the Torrance schools was denied by the Board of Education Monday evening.

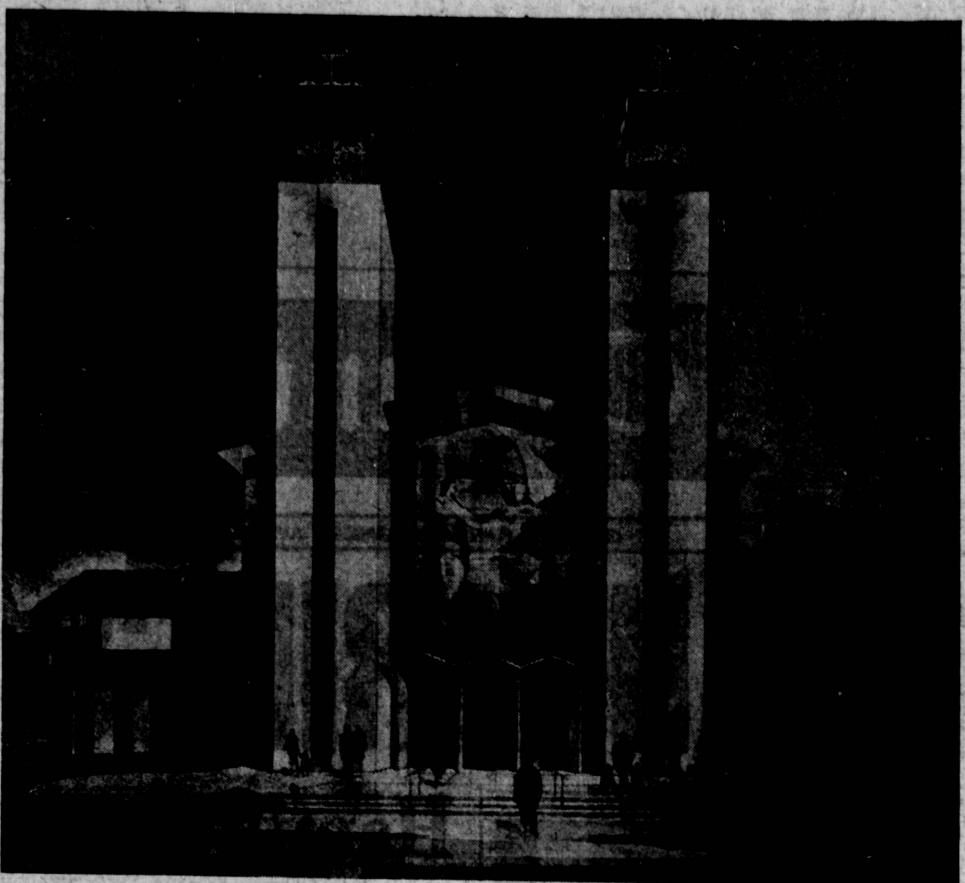
Board policy prohibits solicitations in the schools for all activities except the March of Dimes, Community Chest, and the Red Cross. Board members voted not to depart from the policy.
