(Continued From Page 1) the matter back to the Civil Service Board "for further work," but was told by the city attorney that such action would probably put the commissioners "under duress." His motion was ruled out of order.

"CAN WE GET a transcript of this hearing so we can study it," Lyman asked.

"That would cost a thousand dollars or more," Mayor Isen replied.

Remelmeyer said it would cost at least "hundreds of dollars."

"I will not be a party to any decision on this matter," Beasley said. "I will not sit here and act on it."

After a motion to continue the matter lost 2-5, a motion to concur with the Board's recommendation for the 30-day suspension, followed by a substitute motion by Mayor Isen to cancel the suspension order, brought the discussion to a boiling point.

"I'M EXTREMELY unhappy about the entire situation," Beasley said. "I've always understood since I was a little kid that when you raised your right hand, you were supposed to tell the truth."

Attorney William McCabbe, representing Lieutenant Cook, and the officer who had been seated in the audience, agreed that the city would not be subjected to suits by Cook for the suspension and dismissal order of last March.

At the call for the voting on the motion to concur in the findings and erase the suspension recommendation, Beasley and Lyman left the council chamber, refusing to vote on the matter.

THE MOTION was approved with Councilmen Ken Miller and George Vico joining Mayor Isen to carry the 3-2 majority.

H. T. (Ted) Olson and Ross Sciarrotta Jr. opposed, Olson because he wanted to delay the matter for closer consideration, and Sciarrotta who agreed to the delay and said further that the removal of the suspension "smacks of a whitewash."

YMCA Nets \$110,000 in Third Week

Campaign workers trying to raise \$600,000 for the new Torrance YMCA went over the half way point at the end of the third week in the six weeks drive, general chairman George Post said Tuesday evening.

Post told the weekly report dinner meeting a total of \$110,626 in cash and three-year pledges was collected during the third week, bringing the total of \$322,436. The total represents 53.6 per cent of the goal.

Highlight of the third report dinner was the report of special gifts campaigner Mervin Schwab who reported the largest single gift to date — \$16,000 for the youth game room presented by builder Don Wilson.

Roy Donley, the architect for the new YMCA facility, was the featured speaker. Donley promised to create an attractive and economical building to serve local youth.

The drive will continue until the May 26 banquet.

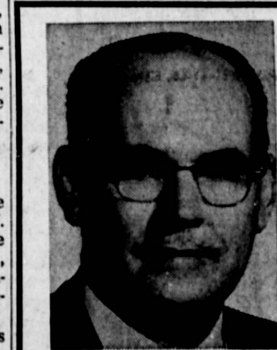
