RHODA SMITH

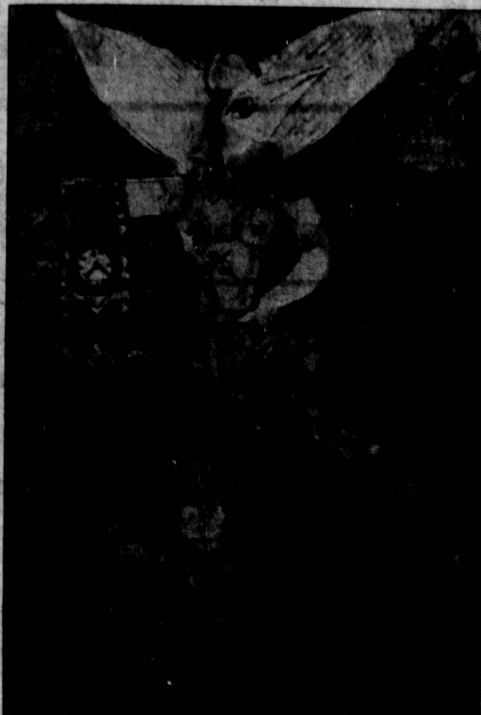

... Let's Go

Marc Chagall has long been a favorite of mine. His strange dreamlike paintings always evoke a feeling of peculiar attachment to the characters he portrays.

So many of his works are in private collections throughout the world and not too many museums own his paintings — as compared to such greats as Picasso and Braque. The Fine Arts Museum in Munich, Germany had several Chagalls when I was there in 1961. Hope that there is room in this issue to show one of my favorites there — "The Juggler."

VINCENT PRICE has his Sears Collection of paintings, watercolors and graphics at the Sears store in Buena Park for the next few days and as usual it's worth seeing.

The main attraction is the \$25,000 "The Mystical Rose Madonna" by Salvador Dali that was commissioned by Sears for its collection. For the more typical Sears customer there are copies of the colored lithograph of the same subject — each lithograph signed and numbered by the artist. Only \$400 each.

My particular interest, however, when I went to see the collection was to see the five Chagall lithographs on exhibit. I have bought several in Paris at various times (and since sold them all) so naturally I was interested in what they were and how much. From \$180 to \$310 and real buys at that.

MARC CHAGALL was born in Vitebsk, Russia, in 1899, the eldest of eight children. His childhood was dominated by poverty, hunger and religious devotion. His parents belonged to a small Jewish sect known as Hasidim, who hold to a mystical belief in the omnipresence of God and believe that communion with Him is found not in abnegation — but in an ecstasy achieved through joyous dancing and singing in praise of the Lord.

Memories of Chagall's childhood — his father, his mother (he called her eyes "a city of tears") — his uncle who played the fiddle (badly), his grandfather, who often sat on

the roof of the house to catch the evening breeze — all these run through his work in sweet-sad sentiment.

They are only part of the thousands of fragments that appear in his paintings — bits of his life and feelings in a tender world where fiddlers sit in trees or flowers glow with incandescence against ink-black skies.

THE SEARCH for "an innocent newborn language" has always driven Chagall. He dislikes words like "fantasy" and "Symbolism" applied to his work — but what better way to describe the fancies which flow from his magic brush?

His lovers literally walk on air, or soar, enraptured, into the beautiful heavens. He puts wings on clocks — for does not time fly? — and sends blue cows over ghostly moons.

His lamp posts walk — his fish swim in space — his winged sleighs and goats float over rooftops. He puts the head of a hen on the body of a woman and merrily colors faces blue or green. Yet Chagall insists that "there are no stories in my pictures — no fairy tales, no popular legends — our whole inner world is reality — perhaps more than the apparent world."

I HAVE WRITTEN to my Paris agent to find me two or three "extra good" signed lithographs by Picasso, Braque, and Chagall.

Their value will go up tremendously and will become harder to locate in the future. The demand is great at this particular time and will increase.

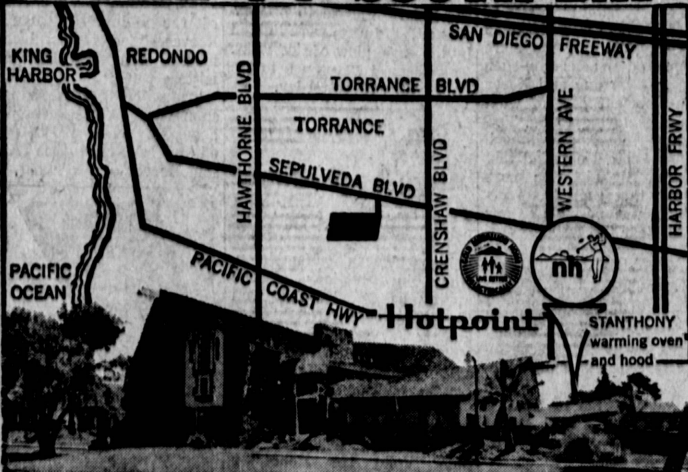
