Here to Attend Graduation

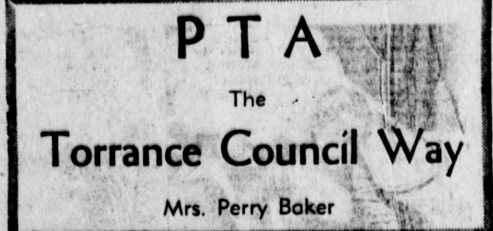
