Vernitron Listed on Exchange

Vernitron Corp., with plants in Torrance and Farmingdale, New York, has been listed on the American Stock Exchange. The firm was admitted to listing and dealings with 633,556 shares of common stock. Vernitron manufactures electro-magnetic servo components used in missile and space vehicle systems, air traffic, fire control, and navigation. The firm was organized in 1959. It acquired United Scientific Laboratories, Inc., of Long Island, New York, in 1963, and now also produces under the name "DeWald." The Torrance division is engaged in development and manufacture of electro-magnetic transducers used in servo mechanisms. Trading opened after the listing on 500 shares at 7 3/8. The ticker symbol is VRN.
