### **PUC Orders** Refund of \$4,057,032

The State Public Utilities Commission has ordered South-rn California and Southern To Description Counties Gas Companies to re-fund an additional \$4,057,032

fund an additional \$4,057,032 to customers.

Refunds will amount to 69 cents for domestic customers of Southern California Gas and 65 cents for Southern Counties' domestic customers. Refunds will be made by credits applied to June bills.

Bulk of the amount to be refunded results from a settlement obtained by the PUC which requires El Paso Natural Gas Co., chief out-of-state gas supplier, to pass on refunds received from its natural gas producers.

Settlement followed years of litigation before the Federal Power Commission. The Cali-fornia Commission directed all gas distributing companies to file plans for refunding all amounts they received from El

Paso.
Since 1963, the PUC ordered the two southern companies to refund more than \$70 million, including the new amount.
