A special feature of the program this year makes it possible for a person to attend and eight weeks or 10 weeks session, thus allowing time for individual vacations. A diversified program for children, designed to meet the wishes of any family, includes a special trip to Disneyland, two full days of Day Camp activity, an afternoon of movies and games and individual classes in dancing and other activities.
