Come join the bands at Disneyland! And such bands! Duke Ellington's music will rock the Golden Horseshoe Saloon. Benny Goodman will swing in Tomorrowland's 20,000 Leagues area along with the Elliott Brothers. Count Basie will beat the blues at the Space Bar and Wayne King will waltz at Plaza Gardens.

All five bands will be on stage for listening and dancing Saturday through Wednesday evenings for Disneyland's big band festival.

Tinker Bell's flight over Sleeping Beauty's Castle and a giant fireworks display will open the festival each evening, 9 p. m. to 1 a. m. June 13 and 8 p. m. to midnight on the four succeeding nights.

Following the festival, Disneyland's "After Dark" talent line-up includes, the Elliott Brothers, the Young Men from New Orleans, the Spacemen and Kay Bell, the famous Firehouse Five Plus Two, the Ward Gospel Singers, Royal Tahitians and the Mad Mountain Ramblers.

Miss Evelyn Smith, president of Indian Village and founder of the Fish Shanty restaurants, has issued an invitation to all Southwest residents, to enjoy "an adventure in dining for the entire ribe," comes June 22, the official opening date for this family-style restaurant.

"Instead of continental style cuisine," states Mrs. Virginia Smith Haack, member of the Smith family and manager of the new project, "dishes will be served without classic European sauces but cooked from the Smith family's own famed recipes. The approach to food preparation, not unlike the seafood and quality non-fish specialties served the past 16 years at the Fish Shanty, will be truly American."

Building materials and appointments for the Village, initial part of a three-phase \$1 million dining and commercial complex, were selected from those natural resources available to the early American Indian.

According to Lyle R. Wheeler, who created the new image and designed the facility, this is the first restaurant featuring an authentically North American Indian motif.

"It is typified by a tribal theme carried out in fixtures, furnishing, food service, menus and uniforms as well as in general decor and architecture," he said. Earthy colors of yellows, reds and orange warm the interior and the exterior is accented by Indian-red eucalyptus poles criss-crossing a Navajo white background.

The porte-cochere, featuring colorful totem poles, adds design unity and provides a unique entrance.
