I am infuriated when I see these monstrosities collecting high praise and winning prizes. Not long ago the winner of the first prize in an important Canadian exhibit confessed to his friends that he smeared his automobile tires with paint, put down the canvas in the drive way and backed over it several times.

In your own city of Chicago the Norman Wait Harris Silver Medal Award plus \$1,000 was awarded to a woman who entered a solid black canvas. How can people take such garbage seriously? I'm convinced the artists are enjoying the joke privately, and laughing all the way to the bank. Do you agree?—THILLILLA

Dear Thillilla: There is good modern art and there is bad modern art. The same can be said of representational art. Each school has its ardent devotees—and they'd rather fight than switch. So relax.

The "garbage" to which you refer was Ad Reinhardt's "Abstract Painting—1958-1962." While a great many people who saw it swore it was a solid black canvas, the blue ribbon panel of judges thought they saw something else.
