Local Eighth Grader Wins Writing Honors

A 13-year-old Greenwood Elementary School student won national honors this week as one of 11 Southern California students selected for national writing awards by Scholastic Magazines of New York City.

Susan Bundy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reid L. Bundy, received an embossed certificate of merit in the annual competition which drew entries from 2,460 schools in all of 50 states, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. schools.

She was named among the winners in the junior poetry division.

OTHER SOUTHLAND winners included nine high school students and one junior high student. Prizes were awarded for the best manuscripts in major categories of writing including short story, poetry, articles, and dramatic script. The Torrance winner had entered the poetry division.

Presentation of the certificate was made by Norma Barretta, Greenwood teacher, at an awards assembly Thursday afternoon.

More than 3,200 teachers sent in the best work of their students for judging by 27 prominent authors and critics who based their decisions on originality, quality of expression, and writing skills, according to the announcement of winners by Scholastic Magazines officials.

The writing awards competition was established in 1926 to encourage creative writing by students in public and parochial schools.

Torrance Adult School To Hold Summer Session

Torrance Evening High School ventures into a new area this year with the opening of summer classes for a six week period on June 22. It is the first time the adult schools have offered classes during the summer.

Registration for classes may be completed Monday through Friday at the Adult School office, 2200 W. Carson St. Office hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Advance registration is required for students who want credit toward a high school diploma or other license.
