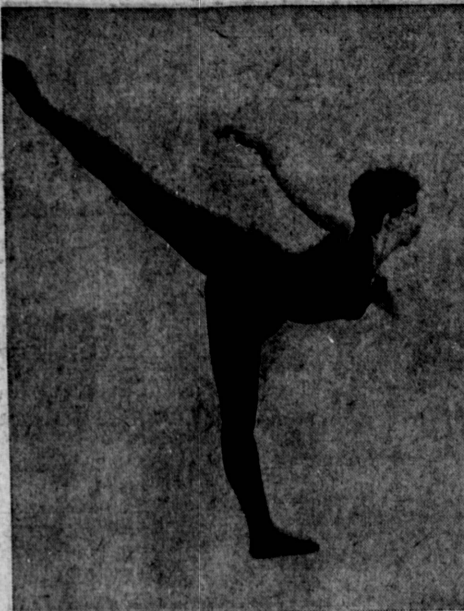

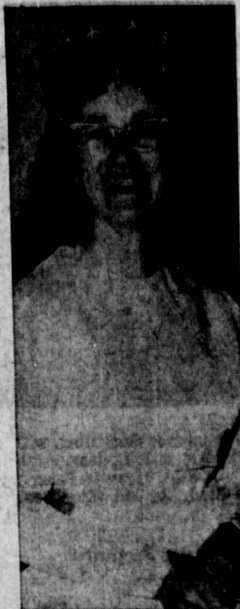
B'nai B'rith Will Hear Book Review
