Miss Pamela Covilli, in a long olive green crepe with Empire trimming of blue and carrying a white wicker basket of blue daisies, was the maid of honor.

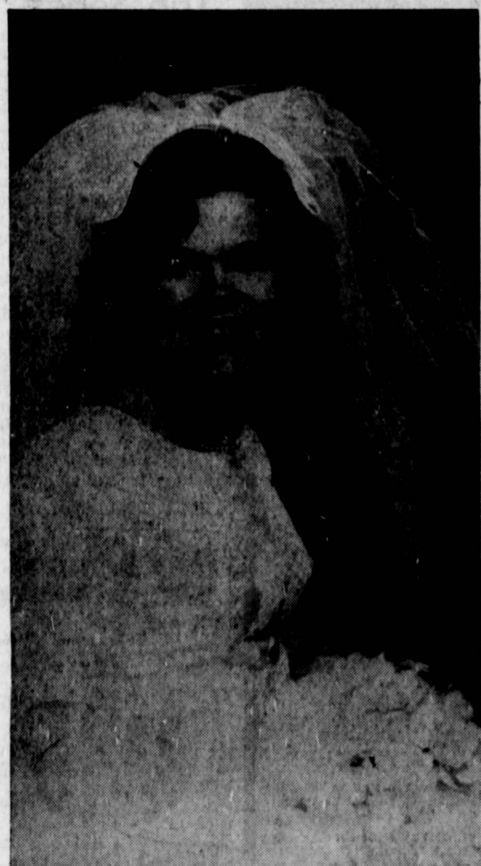
