- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 avocado, peeled and cut in slices

Melt butter in large saucepan. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Slowly add milk and onion.

Prepare orange tapioca pudding mix according to directions. Spoon pudding into serving dishes when made. Top with honey and toasted almonds when serving.

Filling Brings Beef Delight

Stuck in a menu rut? You need never be in this kind of a rut as long as there are so many hamburger varieties on parade.

SURPRISE HAMBURGERS

- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tsp. prepared horseradish
- 1 tbs. ketchup
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 tbs. finely chopped onion
- 6 hamburger buns, split and toasted

Combine ground beef, 1 1/4 teaspoons salt and the pepper. Shape into 12 thin patties by rolling between waxed paper with rolling pin.

Combine sour cream, horseradish, ketchup, 1/4 teaspoon salt and onion. Spoon approximately 1 1/2 tablespoons sour cream mixture in center of six patties.

Top with remaining patties and seal edges. Set oven regulator for broiling.

Place patties on rack in broiler pan so tops of patties are about three inches from heat.

Broil five minutes; turn and broil an additional five minutes. Serve in toasted hamburger buns.
