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What Does a Scotsman Wear Under His Kilt?

Employment Gains Told By Director

Total employment in the Los Angeles, Long Beach, Orange County area rose seasonally from 3,008,800 in April to 3,020,300 in May. Albert B. Tieburg, director of employment has announced.

The current total was 2.8 per cent higher than the May 1963 level and was second only to the all-time peak of 3,029,000 registered last December. Unemployment also showed a moderate rise of 3,500 over the month to 175,000 from an April total of 173,000.

Hiring was particularly active in construction, trade, services and agriculture, but all groups made gains or were were at April levels.

The increase in jobless during the month was largely attributable to the beginning of the usual summer influx of students and graduates into the labor market.



Gourmet Dining A Thrill

The keenest craving for excitingly different food is satisfied at the Pen & Quill hotel-restaurant in Manhattan Beach, which is justly high on the lists of those who enjoy adventures in gourmet dining. Haute-cuisine that's really "haute," but at prices appreciably lower, is prepared here by Chef John Giorgio, who has an enviable reputation for distinguished food.

The Pen & Quill menu is impressively varied and abounds with freshly-caught seafoods, as well as continental dishes and dinners from the charcoal-broiler. Actually, the cuisine is international. You couldn't take the entire epicurean tour in one evening, but you could make a good start with Australian Lobster Tails, Louisiana Seafood Platter or Japanese Frog Legs.

Expert Ullman Logs Conquest of Everest

Like classic tales of the sea, stories of big mountaineers are nearly always thrilling—especially if they are stories of success in the face of incredible odds. In "Americans on Everest," James Ramsey Ullman presents such a saga. This is the official account of the 1963 expedition led by the California adventurer Norman G. Dyhrenfurth. Other members of the expedition have their say in this book, too, but it is mostly Ullman who describes this remarkable feat. It must remain a classic of its kind.

An experienced climber himself, Ullman is the author of "The White Tower," "The Age of Mountaineering" and other books on this sport and way of life. He is also a novelist, but he seems to be back to his first love here, writing beautifully about the greatest of all peaks. He does so with zest, sophistication and, as a reporter, and almost unparalleled knowledge of the finer points of this dangerous game.

For reasons of health, Ullman did not participate in the actual assault on Everest. He stayed relatively close by, in Nepal. But here is the record, onward and upward, a team effort in which six of the 19 members of the expedition—five

Americans and one Sherpa—fought nature to a draw to reach the 29,028-foot summit.

In a foreword to this drama, Dyhrenfurth (who failed in his first assault on Everest in 1952) discusses the economics of Himalayan adventuring. His budget estimate was \$186,000. A colleague commented: "Norm, you're crazy . . . Nobody gives that much of a damn about mountains and mountaineering." As an afterthought he added: If you get it, you don't ever have to climb the mountain; you will deserve a medal for just raising the dough.

Raise the dough they did; climb the mountain they did. Ullman's documentary record suggests once again to the groundlings among us that mountaineers are a breed apart—crazy perhaps, but there they are.

"The Mountain World," published by the Swiss Foundation of Alpine Research, is a series of articles, plus superb photographs, by a variety of specialists. "Over the Alps in a Free Balloon," for instance, in which Fred Dolder describes the Alpine Balloon Sport Week of 1962. (Something, by the way, quite unlike the sequence with Cantinflas in "Around the World in 80 Days.") Entries from Mount McKinley, the Andes of Venezuela, the Himalayas, Antarctica, the Andes of Switzerland, is edited by Malcolm Barnes and seems to be aimed primarily at collectors of mountaineering lore. Certainly a handsome item, (Rand McNally; \$6.95.)



Scouting Builds Better Men

Marineland Menu Appeals To Lovers of Good Food

Devotees of good living are ever on the move, and one of their stopping-off places is Marineland Restaurant in Palos Verdes. Here the list of seafood, chicken and charcoal-broiled steaks-and-chops is selective and eminently satisfactory. The menu presents a galaxy of exciting entrees and every one of them is lovingly and masterfully cooked by Chief Dutch Holland.

Two of his celebrated treasures are Marineland Twin (lobster tail and petite filet mignon) and artichokes filled with King crabmeat. Many guests date upon the broiled mahi-mahi, the mountain trout, prime ribs of beef and the lobster thermidor. These and other epicurean dishes attract patrons from many distant communities as they do a large core of localities.

Dinners are served at Marineland Restaurant from 4 p.m. 'til 10 p.m., except Fridays and Saturdays when dining service is extended until 11 p.m.
