

First Day Classes Hit 13,000 Here

Attendance at the first day of summer school in Torrance came within 10 per cent of predicted enrollment.

More than 13,000 students made it to class Monday. Of the 13,645 pupils present, 4,080 were high school students and 9,566 were elementary students.

Pre-school registration was 15,000.

Largest summer student body on the elementary level was at Seaside School with 526 enrollment. Also included in the top five, attendance-wise, were: Riviera, 413; Edison, 400; Victor, 396; and Casimir, 392.

High school attendance was as follows: North High, 1,333; South High, 1,305; Torrance High, 854; and West High, 558.

Figures for last year show that 8,656 students made it to elementary school the first day and 3,586 to high school. By the end of the first week elementary had dropped to 8,464 and high school rose to 4,037.

Reclaiming of Used Water Considered

A comprehensive program to salvage up to 100 million gallons of water a day in Los Angeles County was personally outlined by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn to ranking officials of the United States Department of the Interior.

Assistant Secretary of the Interior Kenneth Houm expressed keen interest in the plan and immediately began consideration of it in Washington D.C.

The program, already deemed feasible and economical by the County Sanitation Districts, would establish nine water reclamation plants and expand the existing Whittier Narrows reclamation facility in Los Angeles County.

PLANTS WOULD be established in both the Inglewood and Dominguez areas.

Supervisor Hahn is seeking a \$20 million Federal loan to finance construction of the plants.

He emphasized that it would be a loan, not a gift or a grant, to insure a sound program without Federal handouts.

Users would buy the reclaimed water and be billed in the same manner they are now for their water supply. Over a period of years the loan could be repaid to the Federal Government with interest.

"AT PRESENT the Federal Government makes huge grants to some area, provides the insurance for savings and loan institutions, housing developments, and businesses.

"It is sound and reasonable that Los Angeles County could receive Federal help in the form of a loan without Federal control," Hahn said. Supervisor Hahn stressed

Tickets are now on sale at the Los Angeles Sports Arena and all Mutual Agencies. Prices for reserved seats are \$2, \$3, \$3.50, \$4, and general admission seats are only \$1. Children are admitted at half price weekdays on reserved seats only at both matinee and evening performances, except Friday night and Saturday and Sunday.

School Bus Seat Belt Study Urged

A study aimed at having seat belts installed on buses transporting students to school has been initiated.

County Superintendent of schools C. C. Trillingham has been asked to meet with officials of the California Highway Patrol, Los Angeles City School system, local school districts and other agencies concerned and report to the county Board of Supervisors on the feasibility of such a project.

California's 9,343 school buses transported nearly one million pupils last year without a student fatality.

"While this is an enviable record the safety of the youngsters in Los Angeles County and the state is of paramount importance. Periodically we read in the press of accidents in which school buses are involved and where there is injury to students," Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said.

"It is now a proven fact that the installation of seat belts in passenger cars contributes greatly to the safety of motorists and their passengers," Hahn added.

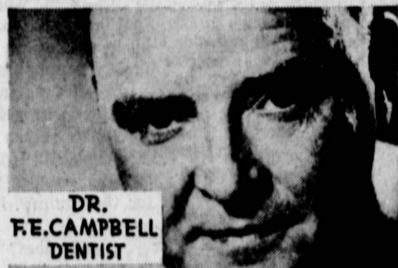
