Plans Completed for Area Independence Day Fete

Dr. James G. Law, attorney, author, and radio news analyst, will be the featured speaker at the Peninsula Independence Day Celebration at Malaga Cove School Saturday. Festivities will begin with a parade beginning at Malaga Cove Plaza at 10 a.m. The celebration is in keeping with the nationwide "Let Freedom Ring" observance of the anniversary of American Independence. Bryan Hardwick, Peninsula advertising executive, is general chairman for the occasion. The parade, which will include military, scout and youth units, will march from the plaza to Malaga Cove School. At the school, a program featuring Dr. Law and an awards presentation is planned. The program is to be followed by an old-fashioned family picnic.

DR. LAW will speak on "A Review of Our Heritage." He is a veteran of the first and second World Wars, a past commander of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, a member of the Disabled American Veterans and of the Order of the Purple Heart.

A prominent news correspondent and editorial writer, Dr. Law is also a radio news analyst.

Following Dr. Law's address, Hardwick will present the John J. Knezevich Americanism Award to Mrs. Laurel Knezevich. The award to Mrs. Knezevich is being made posthumously.

Others who will participate in the program include the Rev. Paul Cox, St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, who will give the invocation; Mrs. Orville Cockley, singing "The Star Spangled Banner," and a group of children who will ring the bells for the 11 a.m. "Let Freedom Ring" observance.

SIDNEY PEPE will lead the community song fest, while Martin Edwards of Redondo Beach will direct the combined choral groups. The Rev. Harley Smith of Mt. Calvary Episcopal Church will pronounce the benediction.

A picnic lunch will follow, with families bringing their own lunch baskets. Following the picnic, competitive games, sack races, and three-legged races are planned. The celebration will end at 2 p.m.

Boys and girls riding their own bicycles in the parade will be eligible for awards for the best patriotic patterns. Entries must be ready at Malaga Cove Plaza by 10 a.m. Saturday.

As part of the celebration, merchants at Malaga Cove

Cancer Society Offering Program for Area Clubs

Summer programs for local clubs and organizations were offered today by the Peninsula Valley-South Bay Council for the American Cancer Society.

"A selection of interesting films about cancer is available for free showing to any organized group," Richard J. Lescoe, M.D., chairman of the Society's education committee, pointed out.

"The Society not only will provide film and projector, but a physician speaker to conduct a discussion period at the conclusion of the film."

David L. McGuire, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. David F. McGuire of 22509 Redbeam Ave., is attending Missile Technician School at the Naval Guided Missiles School Command, Virginia Beach, Va.

He is studying basic electricity, electronics, missile fundamentals and the maintenance and operation of the Navy's Polaris missiles.

Graduates of the school received specialized training in the Navy's Polaris Missile Program.

"During the discussion, everyone with a question about cancer will have an opportunity to have it answered."

Dr. Lescoe said the Society's programs are designed to help save lives by acquainting people with the ways in which early cancer can be cured.

During the past nine months, 185 film showings and programs have been arranged by the local branch.
