

Golf Course Study Asked By Council

City Manager Ed Ferraro has been asked to conduct a study on the feasibility of developing land at the corner of Crenshaw and Sepulveda boulevards as a municipal golf course.

The request, made by Councilmen H. Ted Olson and Ross A. Sciarrotta, was made last night. The land is the site which Torrance proposed for the California State College now located in Palos Verdes.

Olson said the report should be given to the council "at a not too distant date." "I don't know how this happened," Sciarrotta told councilmen. "But I have the same thing. I haven't talked to Mr. Olson."

Sciarrotta said the study should include ideas on how the city could purchase and pay for the land and the possibility of attracting industry to the area on a lease plan. Sciarrotta also suggested the land might revert to industrial uses after 10 or 20 years as a golf course.

In other matters, the council:

- Approved a change of zone from M-1 and M-2 for property at Hawthorne Avenue and Spencer Street to several commercial and residential land use zones;

- Approved a zone change requested by Gilbert Sellan on property at Perkins Avenue and Del Amo Boulevard to permit apartment units;

- Granted a conditional use permit to Philip Furukawa for a 64-unit condominium development at Emerald Street and Anza Avenue;

- Approved an agreement with the Chamber of Commerce in the amount of \$24,300 for publicizing the city during 1964-65; and,

- Adopted, on the final reading, revenue producing ordinances involving a motel-hotel tax, increased cigarette taxes, and increased application and business license fees.

Safety Council Issues Tip for Happy Holidays

With the long Fourth of July weekend approaching, the Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the National Safety Council called on the motoring public to have a "happy holiday by having a safe holiday."

Traffic accidents, Chapter President J. T. Blalock said, can be reduced sharply if motorists will observe six simple rules which he listed as follows:

Exercise courtesy, caution and patience in heavy holiday traffic;

Allow plenty of time for your trip so that speed too fast for highway conditions can be avoided;

Obey traffic laws which were enacted for your protection and obey traffic signs which were erected for your safety;

Cooperate with law enforcement officers who will be doing extra duty in your behalf over the long holiday weekend, a holiday for you but not for the law enforcement officers;

Don't drink and drive; Fasten your seat belts and, if seat belts have not been installed in your car, have them installed before you start on your trip.

If these rules are followed, the safety council president said, the holiday can be a safe and sane Fourth of July and he added:

"The Fourth of July is Independence Day. Let us declare our independence from accidents by driving and living by the rules."

Coordinating plans for the entire event will be the Chamber of Commerce. Edwin Sullivan has been assigned to work with the TMP and Jaycee committeemen.

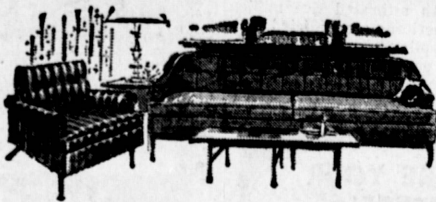

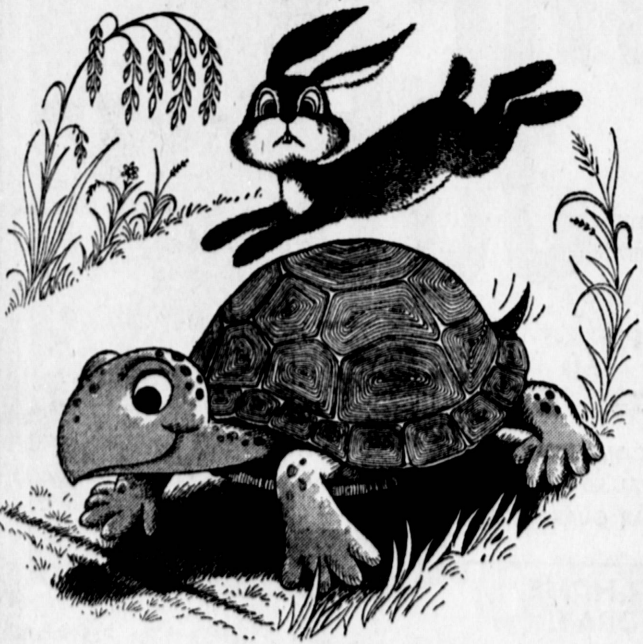
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
