



Morgan Gets New U.S. Steel Job

CHARLES C. MORGAN Given Added Duties

Ensign John A. Dubois, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Whetson of 22628 Ladeene Ave., has completed officers candidate school at Newport, Rhode Island, and has been assigned to duty aboard the attack cargo ship USS Skagit (AKA-105) homeported in San Diego, Calif.

The appointment of Charles C. Morgan as assistant to the vice president - sheet and tin operations for United States Steel Corporation was announced by J. D. McCall, vice president - sheet and tin.

In assuming his new position, Morgan who has been general manager - operations for Columbia-Geneva Steel Division, rounds out the production team named to the newly organized sheet and tin mill operations unit, headed by McCall. Consolidation of these operations under the direction of McCall, Morgan, and A. T. Duff, general manager - sheet and tin operations, is the latest move in U.S. Steel's reorganization program.

A native of New Bethlehem, Pa., Morgan graduated from New Bethlehem High School in 1928 and, in 1933, received his B.S. degree from the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis.

AFTER SERVING on active duty with the Navy for six years, he joined U. S. Steel as an electrical engineer at the Pittsburgh Works of the Columbia-Geneva Division. In 1941, he was recalled by the Navy and served throughout World War II when he received the Silver Star and Legion of Merit citations. He later retired from the Navy with the rank of Captain, USNR.

Morgan resumed his steel career in 1945, when he rejoined Columbia-Geneva at Pittsburgh Works as works industrial engineer. A year later, he was transferred to special assignment at the plant's sheet and tin mill and, in 1947, became superintendent of cold reduction. After serving as assistant division superintendent, he became superintendent - sheet finishing in 1949, and three years later was promoted to assistant general superintendent of Pittsburgh Works. He was transferred to the Torrance Works as general superintendent in 1954, and returned to Pittsburgh in 1957, as general superintendent. After assuming that position at Geneva Works in 1959, he was named general manager - operations in the San Francisco office in 1960.

Morgan is a member of the American Iron and Steel Institute and the Association of Iron and Steel Engineers.

Gets Position in San Francisco

Brother Richard Britton, S.M., a member of the Marianist Order and principal at Serra High School since 1961, has been appointed Religious Superior of the Marianists of Riordan High School for boys in San Francisco.

THE COURSE is designed for persons who need advanced first aid information in their jobs, such as policemen, firemen, ambulance drivers, and lifeguards.

Subjects covered in the hospital lecture series are first aid, artificial respiration, shock and bleeding, chest injuries and cardiac resuscitation, pediatric emergencies, medical emergencies, injuries of the head, neck and back; burns, obstetrical emergen-

cies, psychiatric emergencies, radiation, disaster planning, and transport of injured persons.

Physician-lecturers are specialists in the medical field in which they lecture, according to Dr. Albert E. Ackroyd, physician in charge of the program.

THE 13-WEEK course is sponsored by the South Bay Hospital Emergency Room Committee in conjunction with the Emergency and Disaster Committee of District 9, Los Angeles County Medical Association, and the Training Division of Civil Defense Area G, Medical Services.
