

# Decision On Police Trial Due

A decision by the City Council about penalties, if any, against Police Lt. Donald S. Hamilton is expected Tuesday at a 4:30 p.m. meeting of the council. The decision was postponed during the June 16 meeting after councilmen requested an opinion from City Attorney Stanley Remelmeyer on the power of the council in reviewing the Civil Service Commission hearing.

Hamilton has been found guilty of one count of making a false statement under oath before an attorney general's investigating committee in December, 1963. The Civil Service Commission recommended a 30-day suspension for Hamilton.

**COUNCILMEN** also are scheduled to hold a public hearing on the petition of ADCO Development Co. for conditional use permits and a change of zone to permit a condominium on 190th Street west of the San Diego Freeway off-ramp.

The petitions have been recommended for denial by the Planning Commission. ADCO has proposed development of a 204-unit condominium on the property. The land, bounded by the San Diego Freeway, 190th Street, and the freeway off-ramp, is presently zoned for A-1 and M-2 uses.

**School** (Continued From Page 1) technique. The project was so successful that they have agreed to assemble the language arts booklets currently being prepared by the district.

Another project which was mutually beneficial to both district and student was stamping of book covers. "Nothing can match the pride a student feels in a job well done," stated Foster who senses a need for a place in society for Columbia's graduates.

"Too often," he stated, "these children graduate, vegetate, and eventually wind up in institutions where they rapidly regress." It was this concern for the post-graduate experiences of the boys and girls at Columbia that led Foster and a group of parents to begin thinking in terms of a sheltered workshop.

**THE WORKSHOP**, conceived by the Southwest Association for Retarded Children (SARC) would provide a place for Columbia graduates to perform simple tasks under guidance and supervision. Recreational facilities might also be included in the plan.

Funds for operation of the center would be provided by the federal and state government. All that is needed is two acres of land and an abandoned warehouse.

"Two acres of land might make the difference between a young adult becoming a public ward or a contributing member of society," Foster concluded.

**Ouster** (Continued From Page 1) last January. His ouster Tuesday came without notice when Councilman David K. Lyman brought up the charge that Haidinger had been "lobbying" against a zoning proposal before the City Council on June 23.

**COUNCILMEN** J. A. Beasley, George Vico, and Mayor Albert Isen joined Lyman in the successful ouster. Kenneth Miller, Ross A. Sciarrotta Sr., and H. Ted Olson opposed the dismissal.

Other questions posed by the homeowners representatives asked for City Council answers at next Tuesday's meeting.

"Are our appointed officials and commissioners specifically advised as to the nature of their relationship to the City Council and standards of expected behavior during their term of office?"

"IF THE CITY Council is not satisfied with the performance of an appointed member of a city commission, should that appointee be given an opportunity to resign before he is dismissed so that there can be no stigma attached to his leaving his office or position?"

"In the interest of fairness, would it be of value to delay the vote for dismissal of any appointed commission member for sufficient time to give all councilmen the opportunity to fully consider and evaluate the proposal to dismiss and give the appointee the opportunity to explain his actions prior to action by the City Council?"

The letter, being hand delivered to members of the City Council, was signed by Uerkwitz, Karl Stefek Jr., president of the Riviera Homeowners; F. Willard Bloodworth, president of the Walteria Homeowners; and Paul V. Rustanius, president of the Ellinwood Homeowners Association.

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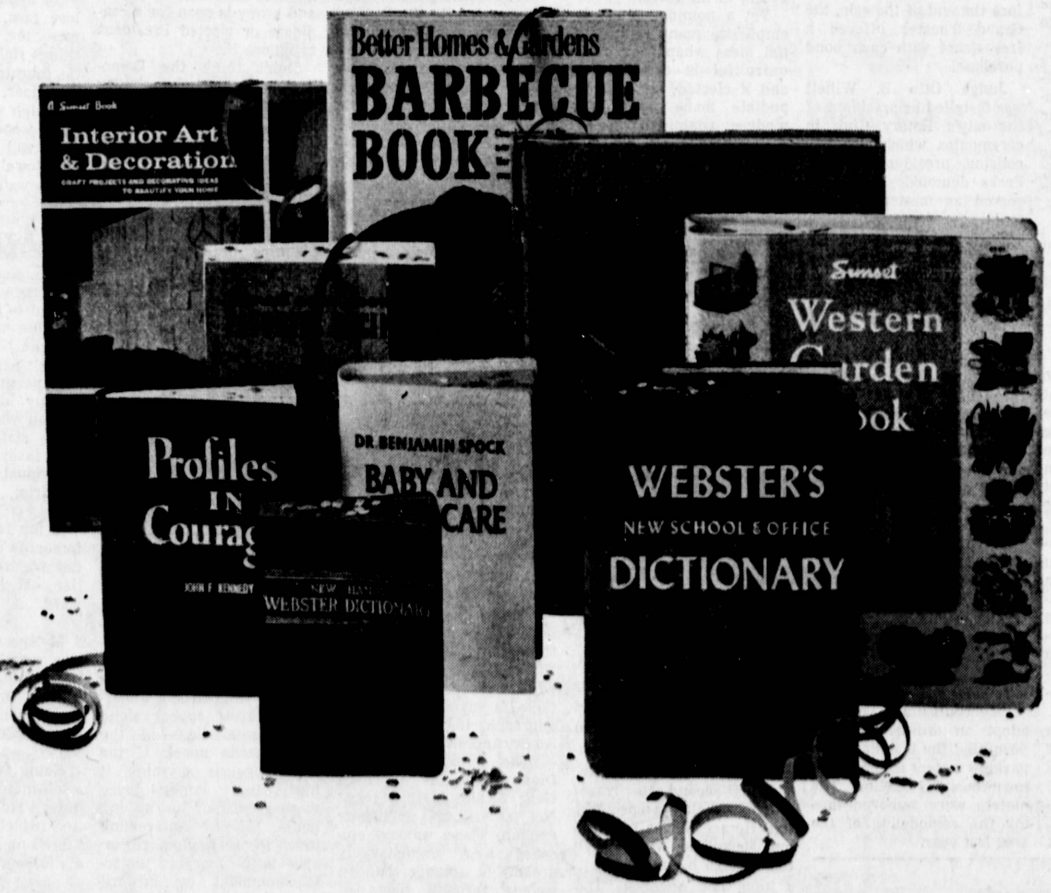
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
