

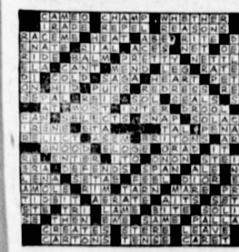
Fire, Police Officers First Line of Defence

 Law enforcement officers are our first line of civil defense. By law enforcement officers I mean the Federal Bureau of Investigation, sheriffs and their deputies, the California Highway Patrol, the California State Police, the police officers of the cities, and the organized and trained police reserve officers means any person authorized and trained to enforce the laws, federal and state, as well as the ordinances enacted by counties and cities. An officer in this sense may be of any rank from patrolman to chief of police. Likewise, an officer of the law may be a deputy sheriff or the sheriff of a county.

Firemen of city and county fire departments are also in the first line of civil defense, but in this discussion the limitations of space require me to concentrate on law enforcement officers in the strict sense of the term. Unfortunately many people, who regard themselves as good, patriotic American citizens, dislike law enforcement officers, refer to them in such uncomplimentary terms as "stupid cops," "dumb cops," etc., but the same people are the first to complain if they want a law enforcement officer and he does not get to the scene of a crime fast enough to please them. In other words, the same man is a "dumb cop" until they need him, and then, when they, their relatives, or their friends, are the innocent victims of malefactors, they complain if the officer does not arrive instantly, or does not do exactly what they want him to do. This attitude is neither logical, fair, or indicative of good citizenship. Nevertheless, it is all too prevalent in the United States of America generally, and in California particularly.

THESE ARE not pleasant things to the people but it is time that we wake up and realize what we are doing to ourselves by downgrading the law enforcement officers. One of the best ways that the enemies of the United States, foreign or domestic, have for subverting Americans in general, and Californians in particular, is to undermine the

County, and within the borders of the 46th Assembly District.

Those actually committing crimes of violence against law enforcement officers, those hurling insults, and those agitating and directing the persons committing the overt acts are not from any one race, religion, national origin, social status, economic level, or educational plateau. The persons doing, or causing the doing, of these evil things are from all groups, hence it appears to me that this is a cancer attacking the whole body of good government.

WHEN I WAS a small child in Iowa, first in kindergarten, and then in grammar school, especially in the lower grades of grammar school, (known in California as "elementary school" because grammar is not strongly emphasized), all children in the public and parochial schools sang a simple little song about the kind policeman who helped children, blind people, old people, and cripples, across the street.

There were verses telling us that policemen and sheriffs were the friends and protectors of children and their parents. Although I never had a talent for singing and do not now sing well, I remember well what I was taught as a child about law enforcement officers and now, as an adult, I re-affirm the truth of these simple little verses. However, it may be old-fashioned to like policemen, but if that is a fault, I confess my fault publicly. I hope you will care to give some thought to this subject. Perhaps it is important.

OFFICERS attempting to make arrest are frequently physically attacked with firearms, stones, bricks, clubs, and other weapons, used willfully, maliciously, and with the criminal intent to cause at least body injuries or death. Unfortunately, those who are the "brains" behind those committing the overt acts of violence against officers of the law are careful to stand out of range of cameras and out of the range of any tear gas which the officers, as a last resort must use to defend their lives.

All these things I have seen with my own eyes and heard with my own ears right here, recently, in Los Angeles

Stockpile Idea Gets New Help

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn's program to provide food stockpiles throughout the state for civil defense purposes has been endorsed by the Northern California Supervisors Assn.

According to Supervisor Earl Ager of Siskiyou County, chairman of the Northern California Supervisors Assn., a resolution was adopted supporting the program and encouraging the State to study the suggestion.

The program, now being studied in Washington, D.C., and in Sacramento, calls for the construction of storage facilities in strategic areas throughout California.

Hahn has suggested using the more than 64,000 persons in custody in penal institutions in the State to build the structures and prepare and package the food. Food would be drawn from the huge surpluses maintained by the Federal Government in midwestern states.

Some states have enough food stockpiled to maintain their population for years, Hahn said.

However, if heavily populated Southern California were isolated from all sources of supply, the Los Angeles area could feed its people for only 60-70 days, and the San Diego area for only 47 days. In personally outlining the program to Federal officials of the White House, Pentagon, and Department of Agriculture, Hahn has stressed that a realistic food stockpile program could be accomplished at little or no cost to the taxpayers through the use of prisoner labor and surplus food.
