

# Auto Production Headed For Another Record Year

Whether or not a new car is a status symbol, as some insist, it is still about the most popular thing for Americans to purchase. Sales figures for early 1964 show more cars being bought than ever before.

Detroit reports joyfully that sales for the first six months of this year pushed very close to the four-million-car level, and this fast selling pace is expected to linger through the rest of 1964.

There is one stumbling block. Henry Ford II recently warned of the possibility of a strike this summer if wage negotiations fail. Nevertheless, optimism in Detroit is hard to dampen.

Nor is Detroit alone in its pleased contemplation of high automobile sales. The steel industry is anticipating a record year in 1964, with production in the neighborhood of 118 million tons, a million tons higher than the record output of 1955. Automobile manufacturers are playing their part in the steel industry's sales rise.

NEW COPTER, old principl-

ple—A jet principle first applied in ancient Alexandria 2,000 years ago may give modern America new lightweight, mechanically simple helicopters with increased passenger and cargo capacities.

Final developmental work is being done on a helicopter power plant which is a Twentieth Century version of a propulsion system known as "Hero's Turbine" and believed to have been named after Heron of Alexandria, a Greek geometrician and writer on physics and mechanics.

Hero's Turbine reputedly was a water kettle with a duct to a sphere. When the water boiled the steam went through the duct and out directed jets on the sphere to produce rotation.

HUGHES TOOL CO.'s aircraft division, originator of the modern Hero's Turbine, says its propulsion eliminates all heavy gear boxes and complex mechanical drive components to achieve a mechanical simplicity and light weight which conventional helicopters cannot achieve.

Rotation of the three hol-

low rotor blades of the Hughes system results from forcing high-energy gases through the hollow blades and out blade-tip jets. The gases are generated in two General Electric Co. T-64 turbine engines.

It is believed the new propulsion system may eventually be adapted to helicopters designed for both military and commercial use. The company has no plans to produce helicopters using the new power system.

**OIL FROM SHALE**—There are a number of signs these days that the nation's commercial oil shale is taking definite shape. One of the most significant developments in this connection is the recent announcement by The Oil Shale Corp. (TOSCO) that the first full-scale commercial oil shale plant in the United States is expected to be in operation by January, 1967.

The announcement, made by President Hein I. Koolsbergen at TOSCO's annual meeting, included a groundbreaking date set for this coming September. Site for the plant is the rich oil shale reserves in the Parachute area of western Colorado, near Rifle.

Koolsbergen told stockholders that TOSCO "has expanded in concept and size from an organization primarily directed to the development of technologies for the production of petroleum from oil shale to a company which, having developed technologies, now has and will develop substantial oil reserves."

TOSCO will be joined in the venture, he said, by Standard Oil Co. of Ohio and Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co.
