from July 1, 1949 to April 30, 1950. Total operating expenses were \$185,731.59, showing a loss before depreciation of \$8782.79. Depreciation is figured at \$17,487.30.

This loss could be absorbed by a tax rate of 4 cents, it is pointed out.

The people want the bus lines, and they are entitled to complete service throughout the city, supporters say. Under good management, it can be done, and until this is proved, the general fund should absorb the loss, and lines should be increased rather than abandoned.

carried adequate insurance to cover all liability.

These details were in the stage of being eliminated by concessions from the operators, and Soderstrom, it is said, when San Pedro Chamber of Commerce decided to "take over."

with the city in eliminating the hold and in banning the entire dump from the area.

When the proposal first was brought to the attention of the city that 10 acres be bought (including the hole,) residents in the area immediately got out petitions protesting expansion of the dump. The property was being offered to the city for \$20,000, through E. C. Buxton, realtor.

City Manager George Stevens admitted the city needs only the two and one-half acre hole, and

later Buxton is reported to have said that the offer to the city has been withdrawn. It was up on this report of withdrawal that the condemnation proceedings were suggested.

Those watching the tax rate joined with residents of the area in protesting the dump expansion on the ground that it is not necessary to remove the hole.

Close proximity of homes to the dump will command its closing as soon as possible, as a health menace, many officials admitted.
