City Council to enact the ordinance prepared to abolish marble games from the city as gambling devices, ministers of local churches will take a hand in the issue and demand immediate passage of the ordinance, the Press was informed this week.

The ministers will throw their weight behind Parent - Teacher organizations who for months have sought to have the games banned because they are used for gambling and because children

are permitted to play them. Rev. Arthur Bello, rector of St. Andrews Episcopal church, said that he had written a letter to the City Council urging that the ordinance banning the games be adopted at once. Rev. Cecil J. England, pastor

The games, particularly the 'one-balls" are used for gambling openly, with pay-offs made from cash registers by operators of the places of business although the machines can be converted in a few minutes to "kick out" nickles to winners.
