Early Freeway Start Favored By Military

Top military officers here favor an early start of construction at the Torrance-San Pedro end of the Harbor Freeway.

The State highway commission already has started clearing right-of-way at the northerly terminus in Los Angeles.

Ed Socolofsky told San Pedro Chamber of Commerce directors that Army, Navy, and Coast Guard officers will back the Chamber's proposal that work be started soon on the southerly terminus of the freeway.

Socolofsky, chairman of the Chamber's military affairs committee, said he had assurances of support from Capt, John Dannenberg, commander of the Navy's Terminal Island station; Lt. Col. Louis Springer of Fort MacArthur, and Capt. John Trebes of the Coast Guard.
