# All Wartime Rubber Plants Here To Reopen

# SYNTHETIC

Rubber Reserve corporation plant operated during the past war and years following by Goodyear Synthetic Rubber company has been reordered, according to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The plant blends styrene, made by Dow Chemical Company, with butadiene, made by Shell Chemical Company, into copolymer or synthetic rubber. Both are Torrance plants.

Dow has continued in operation since the close of World War II, but Shell Chemical Company only last week got its orders to

Goodyear officials admit that the plant is to be reopened by Reconstruction Finance Corporation but said that they probably would not be the operating

.R.F.C. said that it was unable to disclose who the operating agents would be, but the plant is needed to complete the cycle in rubber making with Dow and Shell in operation.

The reopening has been ordered to step up production of synthetic rubber, ordered by President Truman.

Shell will employ about 200 men and it is expected that the former Goodyear plant will employ about that number.

Dow has stepped up its styrene production and has hired additional crews, it was reported.
