TN ARRANGING your living room furniture try to place the sofa so that it faces you as you enter. It always seems such a negative welcome to have the back of the sofa greet you from the entrance door. The best location for a sofa is flat against the longest wall of the living room. A sofa, however, may be placed in front of a window or at a right angle on one side of a fireplace. Never place it across a corner or slanting out from the fireplace. Nor is it good to place it in the center of the toom in front of a fireplace unless the room is very large.

The sectional sofa is often a solution to the problem of inadequate wall space as sections may be arranged in many different ways including a corner arrangement or a bay window grouping.

Always remember that sofas and chairs are never complete in themselves, however comfortable and attractive they may be. Each seating piece needs a useful table within reach as well as a good light near enough for reading, sewing or working at your handicraft.
