

WEST'S FIRST TELEV Relay system to operate between San Francisco and Los Angeles



1. Amplifying equipment like this is connected with the hornlike antennas above to relay television programs or long distance telephone calls from one part of the country to another. Engineers call it micro-wave ... for it uses high-frequency radio waves, and it gets its nickname, "Jump-Jump," because the beams leap-frog between relay stations located on mountains 28 to 65 miles apart.
