
NEGRO GROUP BIDS FOR LAND HERE



Water Profits

Offer Made For 400 Riviera Lots

A syndicate of wealthy Los Angeles Negro citizens is negotiating to buy 400 residence lots in Hollywood Riviera originally intended to be a part of a \$10,000,000 exclusive home development and a bungalow type hotel project. Rudolph Mayer, of Ocean Hills Corporation, owners of the land, said that the City®

of Torrance had tied his hands from continuing his multi-million dollar development and that he had no alternative but to sell and get out of Torrance.

the land from the Negro group which is very anxious to get possession of the 2000 feet of ocean front and beach which is a part of the property. Mayer said that the group is headed by Clarence McFadden

"I have tried to cooperate with the City of Torrance," Mayer said, "but I am tired of being pushed around.

"Our corporation has planned a development of 400 suburban type homes, of from 1200 square feet up to sell at from \$12,500 to \$18,000," he continued. "There are no sidewalks at all in Hollywood Riviera, yet the City Council rules that we must install sidewalks which we do not need, which we do not wast and which no other tract has been required to install. A rural type subdivision has no need for sidewalks. In fact they will be damaging to the development.

PROMISES

"Members of the Council had promised me that we would be allowed to continue without sidewalks. I received many calls from a person connected with the city who said that he could fix it up so that we did not have to install sidewalks, if financing of the development could be arranged through a firm he represents.

"We are at our wits end, and we are selling out. The offer from the Negro group is legitimate, there are no legal restrictions against them and their money is as good as any other groups' money."

Mayer continued that he already has drawn plans for the exclusive hotel on the bluff over

the ocean, but that because the City has imposed unneeded easements along his property facing on Hollywood-Palos Verdes parkway, he cannot continue with that development. He said he made a legitimate deal to have the 220-foot right-of-way of the

Councilmen nd get out of Torrance. He said that the offer to buy Rap Law on **Appointments** Torrance City Council meet

ing Tuesday night was thrown into an uproar by charges of Councilmen Nick Drale and George Powell that unnamed interests are trying to impose illegal restrictions on appointments to city commissions and to the City Council.

The Council adopted, after much debate, an ordinance which would bar a commission member from being appointed to fill a vacancy on the Council, and also would bar a Councilman from being appointed on a commission until a year had expired after leaving the Council.

"This ordinance is depriving a man of his rights as an American citizen," Councilman Drale said. "This is deviating from Democracy."

Powell said, "This ordinance is disoriminating against 40 men who are now serving the city." Drale demanded to know who is responsible for the ordinance, adopted for the first reading Tuesday night, and Councilman Harvey Spelman, with red face, reluctantly admitted that he was. He did not give any reason for his actions.

Thomas Babbitt and Kenneth Beight, officials of Local 1414, United Steelworkers of America, C.I.O., both attacked the ordinance.




C. Ed Jones Home After Illness
