the blocks only) and provide parallel parking along side the island on both sides right there in the middle of the street.

This not only will provide parking for 1000 cars, but it will serve to better regulate traffic at intersections. There will be plenty of room in the remaining lanes of the boulevards for traffic, even heavy traffic.

At present there is only on-street parking space in downtown Torrance for 442 cars. On Cabrillo and Torrance boulevards from Cravens avenue to Madrid there are space for only 282 cars to park. On Sartori (from Cabrillo to Torrance boulevard) and El Prado (from Torrance boulevard to Cravens) there is on-street parking for only 160 automobiles.

With the onrush of the Christmas season, where trends show that more at-home shopping is expected than ever previously, the need for better parking facilities is greater than ever.

which officials refused to make public last week, setting forth Ocean Hills Inc. proposals, is as follows:

"The Ocean Hills, Inc. has encountered an impasse in the development of Tract 16850. Representatives of the Ocean Hills, Inc. met recently with the City Council to discuss the improvement of this Tract. In the course of that meeting a request was made to the effect that a letter should be directed to the City, stating the ramifications restricting the developments of certain acreage owned by Ocean Hills, Inc. located in the Hollywood Riviera. Herein are listed the conditions for which we request relief:

"1. The Hollywood Parkway abandonment offered by the City has in it certain restrictions regarding easements which prevent us from gaining access to our property abutting on this abandoned parkway. It is our belief that this easement restriction might be lifted or replaced, so that we might gain access to our property.

"2. A satisfactory settlement of the two and one-half acre cloud on the title of the property.

"3. The topography of the Tract, being primarily hillside development, is not suited for the installation of sidewalks. It is our belief that the elimination of sidewalks would not be an undue exception to the subdivision ordinance. It is our understanding that the Planning Commission has previously unanimously
