## Long Beach Law Is Enacted Here

True to their word, the City Council Tuesday night adopted as an emergency measure an ordinance to outlaw the possession of

pinball machines in Torrance. The law takes the place of one formerly adopted which was declared "too broad" by City Judge Otto Willett.

The law adopted, at the request of local ministers, Parent-427 Homes Teacher groups with the support of the Press, is the Long Beach ordinance, which has been tried and tested since originally enacted in the neighboring city nearly 10 years ago.

Mayor Bob Haggard with Councilmen H. Spelman and W. Blount voted in favor of the measure, while Councilmen N. Drale and G. Powell opposed it stating they favored a law which would forbid playing of machines by minors.

Rev. Cecil J. England, of the First Christian church, congratulated the Council for adopting the law and said that the people themselves will police the law to make sure that there are no violations.
