Sales Tax For Unincorporated Area Sought

State legislation is to be sought by Los Angeles County which would enable the County to levy a sales tax in unincorporated county territory, the Board of Supervisors approving the program of the County Supervisors Association of California in this matter, according to Supervisor Raymond V. Darby.

The proposed legislation also would permit counties to license business for revenue. At present the business license provides for revenue only to defray the cost of regulation of that business by the County.

Charges have been made by incorporated cities that taxpayers within their limits are taxed for police, fire and other services rendered to citizens of unincorporated areas yet receive no benefits therefrom. The proposed sales tax plan provides that funds received be devoted to paying cost of these services and thus eliminate the above inequality.

Smog Board Denies Local Plant Variance

Refused a variance by the Los Angeles County Air Pollution Control Board was Malleable Fittings Corporation, 1040 W. Lomita Blvd. It is one of three gray iron foundries in this area to be refused the variance.

Paul Grimes, spokesman for the Air Pollution Board, said the companies failed to show during hearings that it is undertaking remedial work to control smog, either by installing devices or contracting for the installation of available smog-control equipment developed for gray iron foundries.

Grimes said the plant is subject to citations for violation of air pollution control regulations since the variance was refused. Penalties are \$500 fine or six months in jail or both, he said. Gray iron foundries in Holly-

Plans Being Completed For Local Farm School

Final arrangements for the farm "school" to begin here in February for dairymen and their employees were made at a meeting last Thursday morning at the home of W. Hornstra, of Meadow Park Dairy in Gardena. Chairman of the local group is Ben Cluff, owner and manager of the Ben Cluff Dairies here.

One of seven Southern California districts able to take advantage of the farm "schools," the local course will be given at the Gardena High School, 1315 Gardena Blvd., Gardena, on Feb. 15, 23, March 1 and 8. It is sponsored by Los Angeles City and County Health Department in cooperation of dairymen.

Present at the meeting were Elmo Moen, dairy inspector for the Los Angeles County Health Department, and secretary for the local group; Ted Van Der Muelen of the Gardena Dairy Farm; Saul Gavurin, supervisor for the Los Angeles city milk inspectors and secretary of the over-all co-ordinating committee; Wayne Hugg, Los Angeles City Health Department district inspector; Melton Natopoff, owner and operator of Avalon Dairy Farms; Ben Cluff, chairman and owner of the Cluff Dairies, and W. Hornstra, of Meadow Park Dairy.

THIRD YEAR
Gavurin explained that three years ago, the school for the dairymen and milkers was first instituted by the Los Angeles City and County Health Department. It was again held last year. Proven so successful, it was necessary this year to break up the districts into smaller areas throughout Southern California so that dairymen and their employees will be able to travel shorter distances to the classes.

Other districts in which the classes are held include Norwalk, El Monte, Cypress, Gardena, San Bernardino, Chino and Pierce. The courses will be given free of charge.
