Torrance City Court Busiest in Area Council 'Deaf' To

## **MOVE TO PUT**

over by Judge Otto B. Willett has a larger case load than Gardena Justice Court presided over by Justice of the Peace John Shidler, a report to the Board of Supervisors on the Inferior Court Reorganization program reveals.

Figures of Chief Administrative Officer Wayne Allen show that Torrance City Court had a total case load of 7155 cases during the year 1949-50, while the Justice court had only 5,500 cases during the same year.

In fact, the report shows, Torrance City Court is the busiest of all inferior courts in the South Bay area.

The figures are lending weight to the alternate recommendation of Allen to the Supervisors that two courts be established in the South Bay area, one East court serving Torrance and Gardena, and one West court, serving Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, El Segundo, Palos Verdes Estates and part of the Centinela township unincorporated area.

TORRANCE LOGICAL That the court should be established within the municipal confines of Torrance seen in the fact that Torrance is the largest geographical area, 18 square miles and thus will enjoy greater growth than any other area; the fact that more court cases originate in Torrance; the fact that the population of Forrance is almost double that of Gradena. and the fact that Torrance City Court handles one-fourth of all cases in the South Bay area. The total case load for all courts in the ares is 31,-965. Gardena Court handled





More than 100 youths from the Torrance area were ordered to duty in Japan with the 40th California National Guard division by the department of defense this week, according to Rep. Patrick J. Hillings, (R), of Arcadia.

Local youths of Torrance's 578th Engineer (Combat) Batta-lion formerly stationed at the Planners Act airport and Company A of that battalion formerly headquartered at the Torrance ball park were inducted into the service Sept. 1 when the 40th California National Guard division was called into active service. They reported to Camp Cooke for duty.

Most of the youths, some just graduated from high school, received their military training at Camp Cooke since induction to the present time.
