County Moves On 'Rats' In Torrance Area Dump

The County Health Department, spurred by the Torrance Fress and the activity of Councilman Nick Drale to "clean up the City Dump" has confirmed that there are rats in the dump area along Plaza del Amo between Western avenue and Border avenue, and steps are being taken to correct the matter.

Thomas G. Gibson, Los Angeles County Rodent Control Inspector with the Torrance County Health Office: "We've definitely established that there are rats on the private dump next door to the city dump. I have turned all information gathered on the dump to my superior, Clifford Woodward, Senior Sanitarian of Rodent Control for the county. Superior officials said that they will get together with the officials of the City of Torrance and that the proper steps will be taken to clean up the dumps."

Woodward admitted the condition exists but declined to be quoted on the matter.

Councilman Drale reported the matter to the City Council Feb. 27 and asked that the city dump be closed, that the private dump be condemned, filled and turned over to the recreation and park

Four other Councilmen sat silent, and his motion lost without second.

Drale said that he will continue the fight, aided by residents of the Kettler area nearby. DRALE APPEAL

Charles H. Quandt, 84, pioneer of Torrance, passed away at his home in San Jacinto, Thursday,

Born in Germany, Quandt came to the United States in 1886, first settling in Wilmington, where he was married in 1888 to Hannah Younghans.

Quandt, drilling his own well, founded the formerly known Quandt Water Plant before 1914 when the city of Torrance was founded, it was said. Drilling the well on his own property in what is now known as Walteria, the City of Torrance in Novemnow known as the Walteria Water Company. He, afterwards, moved to San Jacinto, where one of his sons now resides.

Surviving are his sons, Carl H. 


