Legion St. Patrick's Dance Sat.

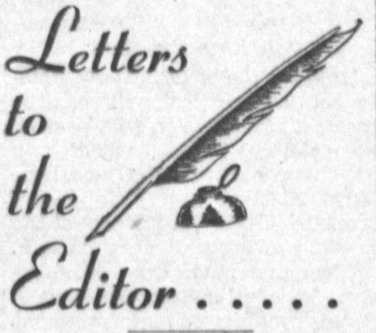

Recreation Dept. Joins Junior Baseball League

All Torrance boys 17 years of age and under, as of December 31, 1951, are eligible to try out and play on a team entered in the Golden State Junior Baseball Association by the Torrance Recreation Department, according to Frank H. Carpenter, Director of Recreation, and Elmer "Red" Moon, Director of Athletics. The Golden State Group operates three divisions of play for boys as follows: Seniors: 17 and under; Juniors: 15 and under; and Pee Wees: 12 and under. All teams including managers and coaches, are required to be fully uniformed. Two umpires are assigned to conduct all league games. All players are protected for the seasons play, including practice periods and transportation by a \$5.00 deductible accident insurance policy. Membership in the league costs \$1.00 per team. Funds to operate the leagues are raised primarily by the boys themselves, who each will get donations for 20 to 30 tickets at 50c each for a grand opening night of each league. A splendid program is staged upon the field with a special door prize, such as a television set or war bonds offered to some lucky player as an added attraction. Funds to provide uniforms for the local entry will be solicited from Torrance Service Clubs, and other interested civic groups. Other teams entered, who will be in the same league with Torrance are: Culver City, Hawthorne, Manchester, Harvard and Boys' club of San Pedro.
