Telephone Rates Rapped at Hearing

Basic methods used in computing telephone rates came under fire this week during the current hearing on an application of Associated Telephone Co, to boost revenues by \$5,950,000 annually. Part of the Torrance area is served by the Associated Telephone Co.

Cost of supplying service and not availablity of service should be the yardstick for measuring rates charged telephone users. contended Henry E. Jordan, chief of the Bureau of Franchises, Long Beach.

It was pointed out by Dep. City Atty. Roger Arnebergh of Los Angeles that Associated uses the latter method.

EXAMPLES GIVEN By this reasoning a Long Beach subscriber, for example, would pay more for telephone use because he could make several hundred thousand calls at

the local rate. Contrariwise, a Santa Maria subscriber could call only a few thousand at the local rate. Jordan contested this philos-

ophy by presenting charts showing how another utility, Southern California Edison Co., bases its rates in various regions on cost of services. This principle, Jordan

tended, has the obvious endorsement of the utilities board which approved the electric rate struc-

POINTS TO LONG BEACH Jordan further argued that telephone service by Associated in Long Beach now gives the company a 7:4 percent annual

return on investment. The company, however, is asking only 6:5 percent net return yearly on all installations in more than a score of Southland cities and communities.
