Counseling Service Offers Courses in


'Remedial Reading' The Compton Counseling Service is sponsoring two five weeks courses in "Remedial Reading" for children. The first session be-

Stars from radio, stage and television, plus a host of local performers, were featured during the program, which took place at 254th St. and Belleporte Ave.


