With 599 students registered at summer sessions offered in schools of the Torrance Unified School District as of Monday of this week, enrollment openings for 100 more students are available, it was announced by Walter Rehwoldt, director of instruction. Number of students enrolled in summer school last year was 443, of which the greatest number of 146 students were at the Torrance Elementary School. Enrollment in the other schools last year are as follows: Seaside, 115; North Torrance, 93; Perry School, 89; Walteria, 83; Fern avenue, 63; instrumental and music classes, 40.
