MORE LEGISLATION DUE Thomas explained that, in essence, this is enabling legislation. It does not in itself set up any boroughs. Nor does it say what form they shall take or

what powers they shall have. That will have to be provided by subsequent legislation in one form or another. Thomas said he has some fairly wel defined ideas as to what powers the proposed borough government should have as applied to Los

Angeles and the San Pedro areas. "But first there has to be enabling legislation for the creation of the boroughs," he said "After that comes the drawing Dane Clark up of specific powers and obligations. I'm hopeful we can get some legislative interim committee study of the matter so that by the next regular session of the legislature in 1953 we can laws on the subject."

Such laws are economically unsound, the dry cleaners' brief argues further. The reasonable price fixed today may, through conomic and business changes, become the unreasonable price of tomorrow, since such prices would not be subject to continuous administrative supervision and readjustment in light of changing conditions.

The dry cleaners' brief also points out that a uniform price for all dry cleaners will destroy competition and that the statute thus empowers the State to create a monopoly, contrary to the laws against illegal restraint of

The statute is attacked further on the additional ground that it unlawfully delegates legislative power to an Administrative Board composed of members of the industry to be regulated, unconstitutionally delegating power to make a criminal law and to determine when and where such law should take effect, and with-


