# PARKING METER ORDINANCE ADOPTED Longren Improvement Plan Gets Protest Referendum On

## **NEIGHBORS**

Longren Aircraft Company may have difficulty in having their proposed expansion program approved by the Planning Commission it was reported this week.

Residents along Carson St Residents along cannot and Date St. are making plans to be present enmasse at the commission meeting to voice their protest against the proposed expansion which will cost Longren between \$100,000 to \$150,000, and will add approximately 12,000 square feet of covered area to their present plant which covers 23,000 square feet. The proposed new building feet. The proposed new building will face Carson Street, and will extend from the corner of Carson and Date streets.

In a letter to all residents in the neighborhood, Longren officials admitted that "Longren Aircraft has been an eyesore to the neighborhood. We want to do something about it now. We want to completely enclose our area from outside view with modern frontage."

The letter also stated: "At present most of the noises complained of are coming from areas which are not covered. Our proposed plan is to have these areas completely enclosed; noises will be cut to a minimum. Longren Aircraft Company has been in your neighborhood for 15 years and we are here to stay. We are proud of Torrance and we sincerely want Torrance to be proud of us. Please help us to beautify our neighborhood." RESIDENTS PROTEST

A survey of the residents close by brought forth a stream of protests against the industry. One resident pointed out that the area was light agricultural and residential, that a special permit had been issued to Longren originally and that it had never been made permanent. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Russell, who live two doors away from the site of the proposed construction reported that noise was terrific and that the only manner in which the neighborhood could be improved would be for Longren to move from their present site to a more suitable site in the inpermanent type of construction is put on the property," said Mrs. Russell, "then we will never be (Continued on Page Two)




