"Either the Council should have cut the tax rate at least 20 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, or they should have appropriated this surplus money to buy lots for offstreet parking," said Councilman Nick Drale, sole opponent of the meters on the city's legislative body.

"There is no need to doubletax the people by requiring them to deposit coins in a meter in order to legally park at the curb on the streets of Torrance." LOTS VACANT

Also, it was pointed out, the two lots on Marcelina avenue on which a charge is now being made to park are practically empty during the week, including the late Friday and all-day Saturday shopping rush.

Merchants said that shoppers will not even park there and have tickets validated for free parking. One merchant said that he had not had a ticket to validate from the lots for four months. Another said he had had only two tickets offered him for validation since the parking ots were put into operation.

Checks made of parking spaces available during rush hours in Torrance reveal a 60 percent vacancy on the streets within a block of the central shopping district.

The City Council majority intends to install some 700 meters at a cost of an estimated \$70,000 on the streets in the "Central Traffic District," which includes all the downtown area within the Torrance boulevard, Cabrillo avenue and Carson street boun-
