Its two huge meetings at Gilmore Stadium and the Shrine Auditorium, honoring new citizens, were the forerunners of the "I Am an American" programs. It has conducted many essay contests on Americanism in the schools of California and on the radio, many



On many occasions his audiences have numbered in excess of 5,000 peo-

Dr. Lechner, in his radio addresses, has fearlessly pointed out the dangers of subversive activities and has constructively analyzed basic American ileads: he has engaged in many debates and public forums and has written many outstanding pamphlets and articles dealing with subversive movements.

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
