

Extension of Crenshaw Set For Opening

At 2:30 p. m. on Thursday, September 27, the first public road leading to the crest of the Palos Verdes Hills, will be opened. It is part of Crenshaw Boulevard which will extend by 1953, from Wilshire Boulevard straight through to its terminus on the ocean at Portuguese Bend.

Openings of the new road from Palos Verdes Drive North to Crest Road will provide a trans-peninsula highway cutting through a scenic area heretofore reachable only over private roads. Supervisor Raymond V. Darby and officials of the county road department and sheriff's department will be present for the ribbon-cutting and road-opening ceremonies which will take place at the intersection of Crenshaw and Crest Road.

The new link is composed of Crenshaw, Silver Spur and Montenalaga roads and with its opening, the Palos Verdes Corporation is deeding to Los Angeles County approximately four miles of Crest Road so the public can drive across the Palos Verdes Peninsula from Palos Verdes Drive North to the point where Crest exists on Palos Verdes Drive South near Point Vicente Light-house.

Jack White, president of the North Torrance Civic Improvement Association, said: "I think that most of the people in North Torrance want the annexation of Alondra Park to Torrance. I believe that in the October meeting of the group, the people out there will recommend such action to the City Council."

"Gardena has tried to annex Alondra Park four times," he said. "One of the nearby cities will eventually annex the area and we think that Torrance should not let someone else do so."

"We feel that the annexation would not only be the best move for those people out there but also for the city of Torrance."

Annexation of the district to Torrance would put Torrance in the undisputed third place in geographical size in Los Angeles County, if not in second place, it was pointed out.

Theatre Veteran to Teach Adult School Drama Workshop

A Drama Workshop class will again be offered by the Torrance School of Adult Education class this fall, according to Danny Desmond, instructor and experienced showman. The class will be offered every Tuesday evening from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. in room 101 of the High School, starting September 18.

A very successful course was taught during the summer session just past in which the class did a series of three one-act plays. Desmond said that it is hoped that this can be repeated with a full length play this year, climaxing the term's work.
