Harris contended that the ity of Torrance had applied for ermission to create what is known as a valley dip.

"It is a driving hazard, particularly in the rainy season, and traffic safety is our primary interest," Harris said.

Harris said that oiginally the State had planned to take care of the drainage problem. He said that a further check showed that legally the State is not permitted to provide drainage problems created by private property. Harris also pointed out that there is no way to hold the subdividers unless the Council has a special ordinance.

Even though a year has passed, no action appears to be in sight. The problem was referred to the State by Jack White, president of the North Torrance Civic and Improvement Association. White took a trip to Sacramento to get the State to pave the street, His efforts met with failure.

"I don't know where the money is coming from to give the residents some relief in this area," said City Engineer Jo-

"I feel sorry for the home-Downers in this district," said Harris. "They didn't know that they would create a sump by watering their lawns. However, the State Highway Division has no interest in the matter unless the sump becomes a traffic

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
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
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
