Stanger Speaks **Local Water Districts Belong to the People** October 12, 1951

Editor, Torrance Press:

I notice in the issue of your paper dated October 11, 1951, that Mr. A. E. McVicar pointed out to the members of the board, that "In view of the anticipated spread of population to unserved outlying portions of the City, he feels the necessity has arisen for the formulation of a main extension policy in line with that of other utilities, establishing limits to which main extensions might be made."

I wonder if someone in the City Administration does not realize that the water districts belong to the property owners. The other utilities do not collect taxes every year from the property owners, but do pay taxes to the City for installations made by them.

When the bond elections were held in the three water districts, boundaries were established and the property owners in the districts have been taxed since the sale of the bonds. Those property owners are entitled to water mains, either from the bond money or from surplus revenue derived from the sale of water without any additional cost regardless of how far they happen to be from the present mains.

The spread of population has been going on for the past fourteen years to unserved parts of the districts and water mains have been laid to new dwellings and industries without any expense to the build-ers, with the exception of subdivisions and that is taken care of by ordinance.

The Water Department has always been in a financial position to accommodate most consumers except in one of the districts, which was burdened with a worn out system to start with that took all the surplus to repair and replace old mains, but even at that some new mains were laid and the district was on the black side of the ledger as of July 1, 1951.

We should never forget that the property owners are the ones that the water districts belong to and that they pay all of the bills.




