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Engineer Resigns Under City Council Pressure

to become effective Nov. 30, at the request of city officials, the Press revealed in an exclusive story in its last edition. This information was admitted today by George Stevens, city manager, Joseph was employed July 1, 1951, at a salary of \$550 per month.

His probationary period will be up Nov. 30. Stevens said the city engineer did not fit into the "small city" picture.

"By his own admission," said Stevens, "he's ready to retire from engineering. We need a younger man."
A check with Joseph showed

that he was far from the retiring age. He is 58 years old. "I'm going back to New York

and join a petroleum firm as an engineer," said Joseph. "If the people should want to start the ball rolling for an Eisenhower type of draft, I would

be willing to return. However, there's too much intrigue in Torrance under the present setup. I'd rather go some place where I can have more peace of mind." Earlier this week, there had
