Naturally, the hoax was intended to convince advrtisers that the paper perpetrating the "phony" survey vis the best medium for advertising in this area.

Fortunately for advertisers, the hoax boomeranged! It becomes the duty of the Torrance Press, exponent o the free press, to reveal certain startling facts which hve developed since last week's issue of the other paper ws published.

They are:

1. Of 1000 persons questioned about a purported eport of a Door to Door Mail Questionnaire," NOT OLE PERSON had received any such inquiry in person or by mail from the "service" reported to have conducted th survey.

2. Of the 1000 questioned by the Torrance Press, 90 of them said that they read the Press within a few hars after it reaches their doorsteps (and the Press reiches 13,500-doorsteps each Thursday morning in the Tcrance, Lomita, Harbor City, Alondra, Keystone and surounding areas).

3. A sampling of homes in Central Torrance, North Tarance, South Torrance, Walteria, Hollywood Riviera, Sesside Ranchos, Lomita, Alondra, Keystone and other ar as covered by the Press revealed that NOT A SINGLE PRSON had been questioned about the alleged "survey" of the other Torrance paper.

4. We took with us on our survey several major advertisers who were satisfied beyond their own expertations about our 100 percent blanket coverage of ths shopping area, and better than that, they found that the Press is the newspaper which is READ, because it covers the news denied by other newspapers.


