

Sure as Santa's whiskers, it happens every year; there's leftover turkey following the Christmas dinner! Here is a suggestion for a speedy meal that you can have on the table in no time, served so differently that it provides a brand new treat for the family.

This one-dish meal consisting of a steaming entree of turkey, rice

and peas—accompanied by a tangy salad—is ready to serve in just a few minutes. Pre-cooked rice is the quick secret for the turkey dish. 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup hot water 1 cup apricot juice and water 2 teaspoons lemon juice 2 cups fresh cranberries, ground 1/2 cup drained diced canned apricots

C. of any change of address during the period between annual address reports.
