Dec. 21 are 25% ahead as compared with the whole year of 1950, Mrs. Clara Conner, Torrance Postmaster revealed today.

From Jan. 1 through December 21, the total postal receipts were \$211,638.62. For the whole year of 1950, January 1 to December 31, the total receipts amounted to \$168,928,32.

"That means with ten more days to go this year," said Mrs. Conner. the Torrance Post Office has taken in \$42,710.30 more this year. During December, 1950, \$26, 427.87 was taken in. For 21 days of December 1951, receipts have totaled \$32,439.15. Assistant Postmaster Lou Deininger estimated that receipts for the complete month of Dec., 1951 would total
