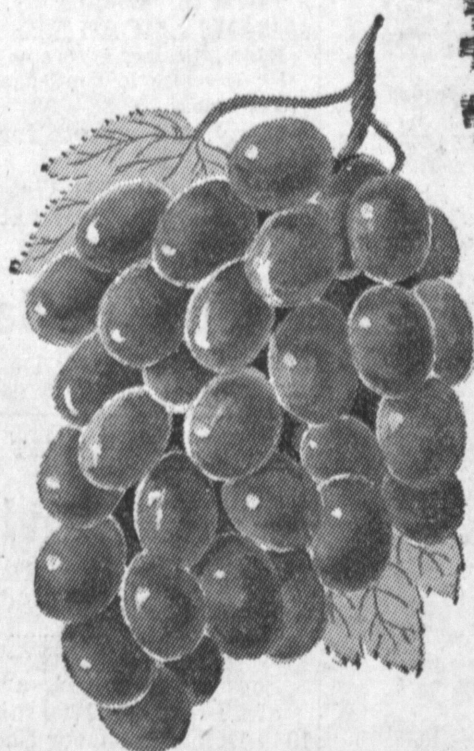

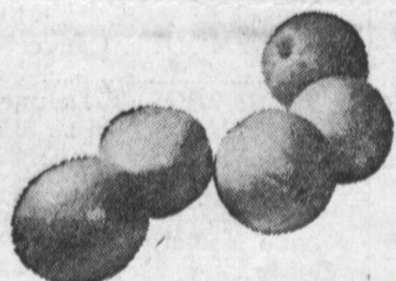

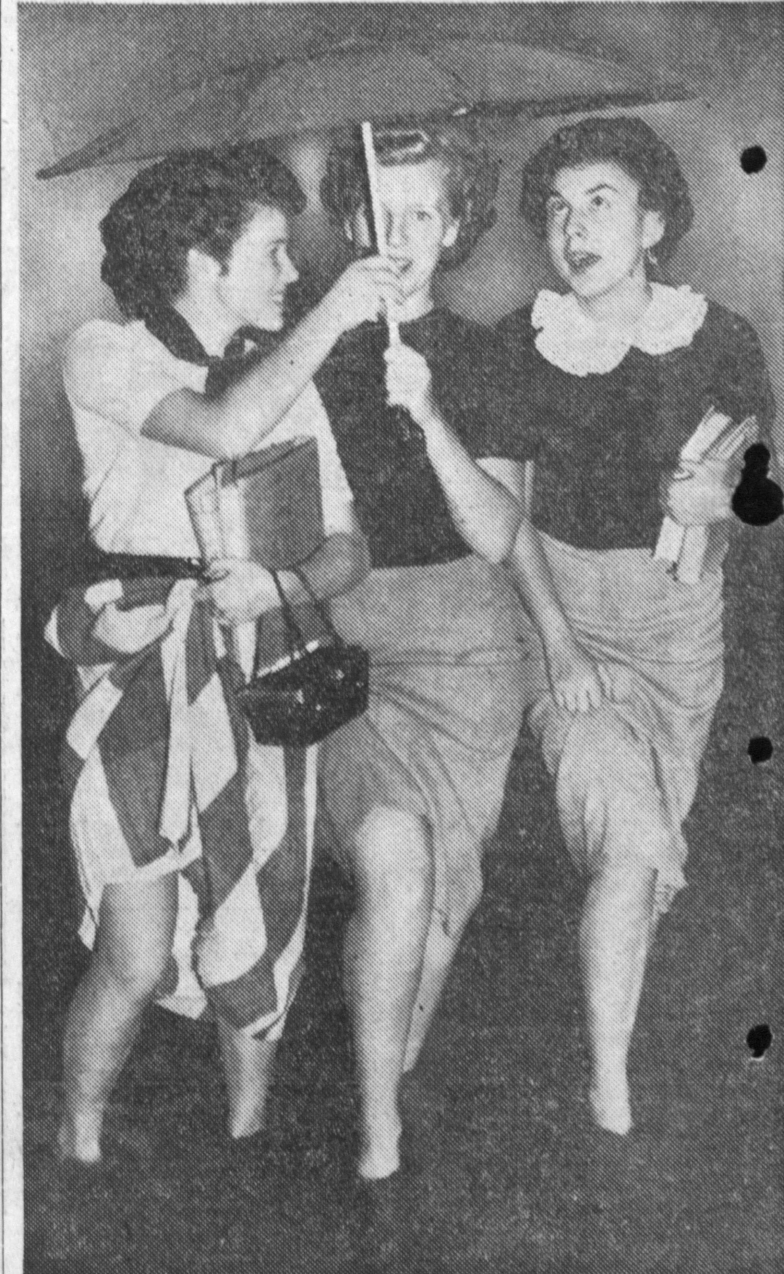

He always wanted a nephew. My son, Michael John Ortega is his first nephew. And guess what? He was born on Danny's birthday, July 20, 1950.

Mrs. Ortega revealed that no one really believed that young Arellano was dead.

"However, we didn't feel like celebrating the holidays," she said. "Things have changed now. We're going all out."

In all Danny Arellano has four sisters, a brother, four nieces and three nephews. His sisters are Mrs. Virginia Ortega, 24; Doña Camou, 22; Rosie Sames, 21; Trini Arellano, 16; and Angel Arellano Jr. 14.

BORN IN TORRANCE

Danny was born in Torrance, July 20, 1932. His mother revealed that he was brought into the world by Dr. Norman A. Leake at 2216 203rd Street.

"You know, the Harbor Hospital didn't even exist in those days," Mrs. Gutierrez declared.

His mother disclosed that Danny was living with his aunt, Rose Grande at 2276 203rd Street at the time she signed papers for him so that he could get into the service.

"He was under age," she said. "He wanted to get into the armed forces so badly that I finally consented to let him go at 17. He wanted to be an engineer."

Every member of the Arellano family contacted was in agreement on one thing: "The announcement that Danny is still safe is the biggest New Year's news that could have happened in Torrance."

Enrollees Advised to Pre-register

All students who intend to enter Harbor Junior College for the first time on Monday, February 4, 1952, are advised by Mrs. Hazel M. Whedon, Dean of Admissions and Guidance, to take the guidance examinations to be given in the college library on Saturday morning, January 5, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

These examinations are being offered to accommodate those who were unable to take the examinations offered last month.

The examinations, according to Dean Whedon, have no bearing upon the student's admission to the college. They will, however, enable the guidance staff to be of much greater assistance in helping students plan their programs.

Enrollees who have taken the tests will be given appointments to return to the college before February 4 in order to discuss with counselors their programs for the following semester.

People who have not taken this examination will be permitted to enroll in February but the enrollment process will be much slower and the student will be given the benefit of much less counseling than if the examination were taken ahead of time.

(Continued from page 1) shall be canvassed as soon as they have been received. All of them must be canvassed and entered by the regular meeting of the City Council on April 15.

April 14 is the last day that the city clerk may receive absentee ballots so that they may be counted.

April 15—Council shall adopt a resolution of canvass as soon as the voters' canvass is complete. Then the city clerk shall issue a certificate of election and administer the oath to each officer elected. The City Council shall thereupon install new officers.
