Sloan, Director of Student Personnel. Hours of registration will be between 9:00 a. m. and 8:00 p. m. in the alphabetical order indicated below. Late registration beginning February 1 will be in the Registration Office of the new Administration Building on Crenshaw Boulevard. Registration For Former Students in Day Classes:

- All Students planning June, 1952, graduation, January 28, 9 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.
- Surnames beginning H through Q, January 28, 1 p. m. to 4:30 p. m.
- Surnames beginning R through Z, January 29, 9 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.
- Surnames beginning A through G, January 29, 1 p. m. to 4:30 p. m.
- Registration for New Students: Surnames beginning L through Z, January 30, 9 a. m. to 12:00 noon.
- Surnames beginning A through K, January 30, 1 p. m. to 4:00 p. m.
- Registration for Former and New Students in Extended Day Program—Night Classes: Surnames beginning H through Q, January 28, 5:30 p. m. to 8:00 p. m.
- Surnames beginning R through Z, January 29, 5:30 p. m. to 8:00 p. m.

TESTS

Tests: On January 19 all students taking the placement examinations should report to the new Administration Building on Crenshaw Boulevard.

English Placement Test: The English Placement Test which is required of all regular students who have not previously completed a college English course will be held beginning at 9 a. m., 1 p. m., and 7:30 p. m., on January 19. The English Placement and other tests to be taken on this date will require approximately two hours. Students who fail to qualify on the English test will be required to register in English 1A.

Chemistry Qualification Test: The Chemistry qualification test will be given January 19 at 11 a. m. and 6 p. m. This test is required of all students who expect to enroll in Chemistry 1A. Those who fail to qualify will be required to complete Chemistry 4 before proceeding to Chemistry 1A.

Mathematics Qualification Test: The Mathematics qualification test will be given January 19 at 11 a. m. and 6 p. m. This test is required of all students who expect to enroll in Mathematics A (high school algebra). Those who fail to qualify will be required to complete Mathematics G before enrolling in Mathematics A.

Business Qualification Test: A Mathematics qualification test will be given January 19, at 11 a. m. and 6 p. m. All students enrolling in Office Machines, Accounting, or Business Mathematics must take this qualification test.

YMCA NEEDS MORE FUNDS

As the YMCA fund-raising campaign was about to get underway, Don Armstrong, as general chairman, released the figures for 1951 activities prepared by John Steinbaugh, chairman of the "Y" Board. He revealed that \$12,500 is needed to carry on "Y" activities for the year 1952.

Activities for the last year include the following: Boys' clubs held 414 sessions with an attendance of 7,097. Committees and inter-group activities, 64 sessions—attendance of 581. Special events such as trips, parties, picnics and movies—attended by 3,321.

Athletic leagues, there were 317 contests held with 7,009 participating.

The day camp program was attended by 1,244.

In the "free" learn to swim campaign, last March, 36 classes were held with attendance of 1,340.

Since the acquisition of the building on Washington Ave., 74 meetings have been held of outside organizations such as veterans groups, churches, school parties, and others.

Torrance High Adult Classes

A varied program of free adult classes is now starting its 1952 year, it was announced by Donald Manshaw, Director of Torrance School of Adult Education. Sponsored by the Torrance Unified School District, these classes are free to all adults regardless of residence. Students may start classes at any time and may go as often as they wish. Classes are held in several buildings throughout the City including Torrance High School, Seaside School, North Torrance School, Torrance Elementary, Fern Avenue School, Episcopal Church, and Walteria Recreation Hall.

These classes include blueprint reading, cake decorating, ceramics, dressmaking, first aid, lampshades, gardening and landscaping, leathercraft, machine shop, nutrition, orchestra, personality, physical fitness, shorthand, social dancing, square dancing, textile painting, typing, and woodshop.
